Procedure for the Hearing: Licensing Act 2003

Members are advised that, when considering application for a premises licence, the following options are available to them by virtue of the Licensing Act 2003, Part 3, section 35, paragraphs 3 and 4:

"Where relevant representations are made, the authority must

- (a) hold a hearing to consider them, unless the authority, the applicant and each person who has made such representations agree that a hearing is unnecessary, and
- (b) having regard to the representations, take such steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

The steps are:

- a) modify the conditions of the licence
- b) reject the whole or part of the application

and for this purpose, the conditions of the licence are modified if any of them is altered or omitted or any new condition is added."

The Sub-Committee will also wish to note that, if none of these steps is required, the application must be granted.

Assuming that the Sub-Committee is satisfied that a hearing is required, then the following procedural steps are recommended. The Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 will govern the arrangements for the hearing of the application now under consideration. This report accords with the requirements of that Act and the Regulations, and in particular Regulations 21-25 (procedure at the hearing).



# REPORT

#### 1. Membership of the Sub-Committee:

- 1.1 The Sub-Committee comprises three members of the Licensing Committee, with a quorum of two members. Unless there are objections, in the absence of three members, the hearing shall proceed with the quorum of two.
- 1.2 A members of the Licensing Committee will be excluded from hearing an application where he or she:
  - 1.2.1 has considered an application in respect of the premises in the previous 12 months as a Member of the Regulatory Services Committee; or
  - 1.2.2 is a Ward Councillor for the Ward in which the premises, subject to the application, are located; or
  - 1.2.3 is a Ward Councillor for a Ward which is likely to be affected by the application or;
  - 1.2.4 has a personal interest in the application.

#### 2. Roles of other participants:

- 2.1 The Legal Advisor is not a party to the hearing. The role of the Legal Advisor is to provide legal advice relating to the application and submissions.
- 2.2 The Clerk is not a party to the hearing. The role of the Clerk is to record the hearing and the decisions of the Sub-Committee, and ensure efficient administration

#### 3. Representation validation meeting:

- 3.1 Prior to this hearing, the Sub-Committee Chairman will have met the Legal Advisor and/or Clerk to determine whether further clarification is required of any issues contained in the application or any representation.
- 3.2 During this preliminary meeting no decision will have been made or discussion held regarding the substantive merits of the application or representations.

#### 4. Location and facilities:

- 4.1 All hearings will be heard at the Havering Town Hall unless otherwise directed.
- 4.2 Interpreters will be provided by the Council on request, provided notice is given at least five working days before the hearing.

#### 5. Notification of attendance:

5.1 The Chairman will enquire of the parties who is in attendance and the parties will indicate their names (and, where relevant, whom they represent). A register will be circulated before the commencement of the hearing on which the applicant, his/her advisers and companions and all interested parties (and/or their representatives) will be asked to record their attendance.

#### 6. Procedural matters:

- 6.1 Prior to the commencement of the hearing, the Chairman of the Sub-Committee will orally inform the parties whether their applications to have certain people attend the hearing (e.g. witnesses) have been granted or refused. Note this relates to people other than those attending on behalf of a party in the capacity as a representative of the party.
- 6.2 Prior to the commencement of the hearing the Chairman of the Sub-Committee will outline the procedure to be followed at the hearing. This will normally be as follows:

#### Introduction of the application:

The Licensing officer will outline:

- details of the application and relevant representations received from the parties;
- relevant legislation ;
- relevant Licensing Policy; and
- the time limit in which the Council must reach a determination.

#### Documentary evidence:

- Documentary or other information in support of applications, representations or notices should be provided to the Clerk of the Sub-Committee at least 7 clear working days before the hearing. If this information is produced at the hearing it will only be taken into account by the Sub-Committee if the Sub-Committee and all the parties consent to its submission. Permission to have this information included in the hearing should be requested at the beginning of the hearing before any oral submissions have been made.
- Statements made by people in support of a party's representation who are not present at the hearing, must be signed by the maker, dated and witnessed by another person. The statement must also contain the witness's full name and occupation.

#### **Representations:**

- The chairman will invite each of the parties at the hearing or their representative sequentially to address the Sub-Committee and call any person/s to whom permission has been granted to appear. Each party will be allowed a maximum period of 10 minutes in which to address the Sub-Committee and call persons on his/her behalf.
- This 10 minute period is where each party has the opportunity to orally address the Sub-Committee and clarify any points in which the Sub-Committee has sought clarification prior to the hearing. This 10 minute period should be uninterrupted unless a member of the Sub-Committee or Legal Advisor considers that the speaker is making submissions that are irrelevant, frivolous or vexatious.
- Members of the Sub-Committee may ask questions of any party, at any time during the proceedings. Time taken in dealing with a Member's question will not be taken into account in determining the length of time available to the party in question to make their representation.

The sequence in which each of the parties will be invited to address the Sub-Committee will normally be in the order of:

- the Chief Officer of Police;
- the Fire Authority;
- the Health and Safety at Work Enforcing Authority;
- the Local Planning Authority;
- the Local environmental Health Authority;
- the Local Weights and Measures Authority;
- the Authority Responsible for the Protection of Children from Harm;
- a navigation or other authority responsible for waterways; and
- any other party that has submitted representations in respect of the application, certificate, notice or other matter appearing before the Sub-Committee;
- the party that has submitted the application, certificate, notice or other matter appearing before the Sub-Committee.

At the discretion of the Sub-Committee the above order may be varied.

#### **Cross-Examination:**

Where witnesses have been permitted by the Sub-Committee to speak at the hearing on behalf of a party, permission must be sought from the Sub-Committee before another party can ask the witness questions. This process of questioning is normally referred to as cross-examination. The Sub-Committee will allow cross-examination only where it is necessary to assist it in considering the representations or application.

#### Relevance:

Information submitted at the hearing must be relevant to the applications, representations, or notice and the promotion of the licensing objectives. The Chairman of the Sub-Committee is entitled to exclude any information it considers to be irrelevant whether presented in written or oral form. The licensing objectives are:

The prevention of crime and disorder;

Public safety;

The prevention of public nuisance; and

The protection of children from harm.

#### 7. Failure of parties to attend the hearing:

7.1 If a party, who has not given prior notice of his/her intention not to attend the hearing, is absent from the hearing the Sub-Committee may either adjourn the hearing or hold the hearing in the party's absence. Where the hearing is held in the absence of a party, the Sub-Committee will still consider the application, representation or notice submitted by that party.

#### 8. Adjournments and extension of time:

- 8.1 The Sub-Committee may adjourn a hearing to a specified date or extend a notice period except where it must make a determination within certain time limits in the following specific applications:
  - Applications for conversion of existing licences where the Sub-Committee must make a determination within 2 months of the application first being received. In default of a decision being made the application will be treated as being granted;
  - Applications for variation of existing licences where the Sub-Committee must make a determination within 2 months of the application first being received. In default of a decision being made the application will be treated as being rejected;
  - Applications for conversion of existing club certificates where the Sub-Committee must make a determination within 2 months of the application being first received. In default of a decision being made the application will be treated as being granted;
  - Applications for variation of existing club certificates where the Sub-Committee must make a determination within 2 months of the application being first received. In default of a decision being made the application will be treated as being rejected;
  - Applications made by holders of justices' licences for personal licences must be determined within 3 months of the application first being

received. In default of a decision not being made within this period the application will be treated as being granted;

• Review of premises licences following closure orders where the Subcommittee must make a determination within 28 days of receiving notice of the closure order.

#### 9. Sub-Committee's determination of the hearing:

- 9.1 At the conclusion of the hearing the Sub-Committee will deliberate in private accompanied by the Clerk and the Legal Advisor who will be available to assist the Sub-Committee with any legal problems but will not participate in any decision making of the Sub-Committee.
- 9.2 The Sub-Committee will normally make its determination and announce its decision at the end of the hearing.
- 9.3 Where all parties have notified the Sub-Committee that a hearing is not required the Sub-Committee must make its determination within 10 working days of being given notice that the hearing is not required.

#### 10. Power to exclude people from hearing:

- 10.1 The public are entitled to attend the hearing as spectators. However, the Sub-Committee may exclude any person from the hearing including any person assisting or representing a party where:
  - it considers that the public interest would be best served by excluding the public or the individual person from the hearing; or
  - that person is behaving in a disruptive manner. This may include a party who is seeking to be heard at the hearing. In the case where a party is to be excluded, the party may submit to the Sub-Committee in writing any information which they would have been entitled to give orally had they not been required to leave the hearing.

#### 11. Recording of proceedings:

11.1 A written record of the hearing will be produced and kept for 6 years from the date of the determination of the hearing.

#### **12. Power to vary procedure:**

12.1 The Sub-committee may depart from following any of the procedures set out in this document if it considers the departure to be necessary in order to consider an application, notice or representation.

This application for a premises licence is made by Tesco Stores Ltd under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003. The application was received by Havering's Licensing Authority on 29<sup>th</sup> February 2012.

#### Geographical description of the area and description of the building

The premises are a single unit terrace shop with the shop area on the ground floor and offices or flats above.

The Shop is situated on the west side of South Street directly opposite Western Road. The surrounding premises are all shops or commercial premises on the ground floor with offices or residential properties above. Within 200 metres of the shop there are 15 premises which offer alcohol for off sales, 9 pubs or bars and a large number of restaurants that offer alcohol with meals.

The premises are situated within the Romford Ring Road and are subject to the Saturation Policy for Romford outlined in the Havering Licensing Policy.

I informed the applicant of the Saturation Policy in relation to this application on 29<sup>th</sup> February 2012.

The premises are situated very close to Romford Rail Station and Romford's public transport links.

a) General - all four licensing objectives (b,c,d,e) (please read guidance note 9)

We are a national retailer that sells alcohol as part of a broad offering of goods and services. We have held off-licences in our stores for many years and are an approved British Institute of Inn-keeping examination centre. We have written training policies and formal training programmes are in place, which ensure our people are equipped to meet all licensing objectives. All training and revision/refresher materials are reviewed regularly. All stores currently comply with our 'Think 25' policy, this is brought to customer's attention through point of sale material within the store. We take legal compliance very seriously and in addition to local training we employ a central alcohol licensing compliance manager and have a compliance committee.

#### b) The prevention of crime and disorder

The premises will have digital CCTV system that covers many areas of the shop floor, including the proposed area which will be used for beer and wine, should we be successful with our application. Images will be retained for a minimum of 21 days and made available on enforcement request. Ordinarily, a member of the Management team will be on the premises all the time the store is open. A person will have responsibility for the premises whilst the premises are open.

#### c) Public safety

A person will have responsibility for the premises whilst the premises are open. Management will be trained to support the running of the premises including looking after our customers and staff. The store will adhere to all rules and regulations relating to public safety.

#### d) The prevention of public nuisance

We intend to be an active member of the community. We welcome the opportunity to liaise with Police and enforcement authorities should the need arise.

#### e) The protection of children from harm

All staff will be trained and regularly refreshed in the corporate 'Think 25' Policy. Staff will be trained to look at the customer and 'Think 25' when selling alcohol.

A till prompt will appear on the initial sale of alcohol that will remind the seller of their responsibilities including not to sell alcohol to anyone under the age of 18.

The store will display signage around the premises informing both staff and customers of our 'Think 25' policy on alcohol.





I wish to object to the above application on behalf of Tesco in South Street, Romford, as the application does not seem to be exceptional and so the Council's Saturation Policy in relation to licensed premises In Romford town centre should not be broken.

There is already a concentration of licensed premises in the vicinity of the application site. Within 200 metres of this site there are 10 off licenses, 9 pubs and clubs and other restaurants. This application offers nothing different from what is already available in the area, and so I suggest that the Saturation Policy should not be broken.

The applicants ask for a license to sell alcohol between 6am-11pm. I am advised that crime and anti-social behaviour peak in the town centre at later hours, and so the late ending time for this application would add to such issues in the town centre as the premises would be open for the sale of alcohol while the night-time economy is in operation and the presence of another alcohol sale outlet in the centre of the town would be likely to delay people dispersing from the town centre after a night out, thereby adding to ASB issues.

Recent decisions by the Licensing Committee demonstrate that the Saturation Policy is being applied in Romford, and this application would not seem exceptional enough to break that consistency and establish the wrong precedents in the town.

With reference to the application for a premises licence for a Tesco Express to sell alcohol Monday to Sunday 06.00 to 23.00 I wish to object. Romford Town Centre already has too many licensed premises as stated in Havering's Alcohol Saturation Zone Policy but I wish to object on the grounds of public safety because its proposed hours facilitate the objectionable habit called pre-loading where visitors to nightclubs buy and consume usually high strength alcohol prior to entering aforesaid nightclubs to avoid buying what would usually be a lot dearer unit for unit. If not drunk on the street it may still be hidden and later consumed on Club or Bar Premises. Besides the obvious dangers of quick inebriation it damages public safety through health effects.

I further object on the basis of public nuisance. I feel that this outlet may well facilitate street drinking despite the Town Centre being a controlled zone as this store lets out directly on South Street stretching the number of places the police have to concentrate on and allowing people in the act of drinking despite the prohibition to hide with the aid of the nearby kiosk style building and in a number of difficut to monitor nearby "dead" zones.

The police are already overstretched late at night in Romford and Hornchurch Town Centres and I fear that this lessens the necessary protection of children from harm as under 18 year old teenagers will be more able to pressure passing adults into making illegal purchases for them because of the fact that the store accesses directly to a wide area, with various routes away, difficult to police. I am also worried by the store layout which does not appear to offer much security to prevent shoplifting of chilled wine and beer or red wine.

I would like to express my objection to the application for a new Tescos on South Street, Romford on the grounds that such over supply of supermarkets in the local area selling cheap alcohol will lead to more youths "preloading" on alcohol and engaging in drunk and disorderly behaviour on South Street. Just this morning at around 3am, I was awoken to the sounds of youths fighting on South Street outside my flat. The fighting became intense enough for the police to be called to resolve the matter. The introduction of another supermarket selling discounted alcohol will simply lead to more of these incidents and will result in even less sleep for myself and my partner. I would like to remind the council that South Street and environs is not an entertainment district, but a mixed use area development which includes a significant number of local residents. The Police wish to make a representation **against** the application for a new premises licence for **TESCO Stores Ltd, 76 South Street, Romford, RM1 1RX** 

- The premises falls within the saturation area of the town centre and full details of the policy can be found on the London Borough of Havering website.
- Police feel that the application should be refused on the grounds of saturation and cumulative impact, allowing this application would not promote the licensing objectives.

## The applicant has failed to state adequately what additional steps they intend to take to promote the licensing objectives.

There are no additional conditions or explanation on how the applicant intends to promote the licensing objectives, given the saturation policy and cumulative impact in this area. This area of the town is under stress, with crime and disorder still rising.

This is a standard application submitted by Tesco's and is a direct copy of the recent applications for stores at 405 Brentwood Road RM2 and 4-6 Fairview Parade RM7.

This application does not take into account all the surrounding issues at this location or mention how these issues can be addressed.

#### The prevention of crime and disorder

The applicant states CCTV will installed at the venue under the crime prevention objective, this has failed in many stores at preventing crime. The Police require additional methods of prevention to be implemented. This may include alcohol being tagged, SIA security, and specific lockable counters for alcohol displays.

I believe the potential for crime and disorder at this location is highly likely, theft and theft of alcohol along with disorder from youths, and drunken violence.

There are no further suggestions on how the premises will operate to prevent crime and disorder.

## The applicant does not define an area to be licensed or the percentage, simply the whole premises. This is not acceptable in a saturation zone.

Tesco's in the London Borough of Havering are a significant driver of crime for the police see below, information current to 31/12/2010.

- The three main types of offences that occur are Shoplifting, Making off without payment and other theft offences
- No other supermarket contributes to the level of TNO offences like Tesco
- Offences are most likely to occur between the hours of 13.30 hours and 19.30 hours.

#### The Prevention of public Nuisance

The applicant makes no suggestion on how they intend to run the store to prevent public nuisance, simply being an active member of the community and working with the police and authorities is not sufficient.

The town centre suffers from numerous issues relating from the sale of alcohol and youth related issues of public nuisance along with young people acting anti socially. What additional measures will be in place to prevent nuisance during the evenings? How will the premises be controlled and managed inside and directly outside?

#### The protection of children from harm

The applicant states "think 25" when selling alcohol will be implemented, nothing else!

I would also like to know what they intend to do with fake ID and the Prevention of fraudulent use of ID? Or how refusals will be documented, how they intend to prevent proxy sales? This is when adults buy the alcohol and then passing on to an under aged person normally outside or close by.

## The applicant has failed to address the licensing objectives adequately for the location of this store.

• **This application is far from exceptional**; it does not provide anything different for the town centre or offer a service or concept that is not already available, neither does it replace licensed premises which closed.

#### Supporting grounds of saturation

The following **off licence premises** are all located within close proximity, estimated distances; less then 500M, many are less then 250 metres from the proposed store these are **high lighted in bold and underlined**.

Key News and Food - SOUTH STREET Am and Pm - SOUTH STREET Sainsburys - THE BREWERY Londis - SOUTH STREET Lidl - ATLANTA BOULEVARD Maxim Food stores - VICTORIA Road Afforda - SOUTH STREET J and B convenience - SOUTH STREET Romford Mini Mart - SOUTH STREET The Russian shop -HIGH STREET Strumbras VICTORIA ROAD Marks and Spencer SOUTH STREET Debenhams MARKET PLACE Iceland MARKET PLACE Asda LIBERTY MALL

• The map on the last page of this representation gives an indication of the locations of both off licences and Pubs, Bars, and clubs all within close proximity.

The London Borough of Havering is amongst the highest areas within the Metropolitan Police for alcohol fuelled violence.

- Off licences play a key role in fuelling the availability of alcohol and often are cheaper than pubs and bars. There is a term in policing referred to as pre loading. This is where a person consumes alcohol prior to attending licensed premises, so the full effects of the alcohol consumed as probably not been felt by that person yet.
- The town centre experiences several issues on pre loading, off licences that sell within the ring road do so with the condition that the alcohol is not consumed in the streets within the ring road.
- This is often disregarded by the person who purchases the item and is consumed within a proximity of the off licence. Many subjects then remain in the town centre afterwards.
- Off licences do not inform customers of this as it would probably result in losing a sale.

Police are tasked to deal with such issues; they have powers to remove the alcohol and any open or sealed containers, if they believe that it will be consumed or is being consumed within the designated area of the alcohol controlled zone.

#### **Designated area**

The Criminal Justice and Police Act 2001 contains provisions specifically designed to address the problems of alcohol related disorder. Sections 12-16 of the Act allow local authorities to adopt powers to designate areas which have known nuisance, annoyance to the public, or disorder associated with the consumption of alcohol.

Designated Drinking Areas are an effective tool to tackle the problems associated with the anti-social consumption of alcohol in public places. This incorporates the under-age consumption of alcohol, the negative image that street drinking projects to the community and the frequently resulting social nuisance which impacts on others quality of life.

- Alcohol confiscation is a direct result of off licence sales. Many premises are
  often totally unaware of the effects they create. These issues are a constant
  task for police officers.
- Drinks promotions and special offers are often deemed irresponsible sales by the police given the issues this town centre faces. The availability of cheap alcohol does not promote the licensing objective under the prevention of crime and disorder and public nuisance.
- The bars and clubs in the town centre have collectively introduced minimum pricing and have maintained level prices with competitors to assist in combating crime and disorder, public nuisance.

#### The saturation zone within the town centre is the designated area.

Police spend a lot of their time dealing with such matters in an attempt to prevent further crime and disorder and public nuisance, this is an on going problem.

There is evidence to suggest that customers from off licences contribute to the global difficulties within the town centre.

This area suffers from a series of difficulties that have arisen from a concentration of licensed premises in the town centre. The cumulative effect is violence on and off premises, theft, robbery, noise and nuisance, large gatherings of people, littering, fouling and a deteriorating public realm.

There is not a single operator who is to blame but together they cumulatively impact on the town centre.


**The licensing objective the Prevention of Crime and disorder,** police officers are at a constant battle to combat crime and disorder within the town centre.

**Section 27 of the Violent Crime Reduction Act 2006** introduced a power for a constable in uniform to issue a direction to leave a locality to an individual aged at least 16 who is in a public place and who presents a risk of alcohol related crime or disorder.

Section 27 notices can effectively target people drinking out in the streets, thus preventing later drunkenness and disorder in venues

## There have been approximately 341 people issued with such notices within the last 12 months. 29/01/2010 - 29/12/2012.

A map is attached which represents crime figures and crime types at this location. This is not the final figure for crime at the location. I have only requested data relating to the offences mentioned in the report and they stated area.

## This document presents a clear image of what police are faced with. The local policy of saturation and cumulative impact are in place and remain

#### <u>current.</u>

#### Disorder, Public safety, Protection of children from Harm.

Police deal robustly with disorder in the town centre and used fixed penalty notices for public order offences, including urination in the streets. Many of these offences are due to alcohol fueled youngsters under the age of 25. The town centre is policed by a dedicated team with local knowledge and up to date intelligence.

The town centre does have a high ratio of licensed premises, within the saturation zone.

## The Borough of Havering is above the national average of failures for under age sales of alcohol.

The use of fake ID and ID being used fraudulently is a still a problem for the police. A recent incident involving a male aged 17 in February 2012 left the male with severe facial injuries requiring a metal plate to be constructed into his face. The male was under the influence of alcohol.

### Other schemes implemented to assist in promotion of the licensing objectives.

In Partnership with the local authority the town centre operates a Banned from One, Banned from all schemes. Anyone who is involved in alcohol fuelled violence and or disorder within the saturation zone can be put forward to be banned under this scheme, a banning notice can be for up to 5 years.

#### Within the last 12 months 279 banning notices have been issued.

The local authority and police work hard to promote the licensing objectives in the town centre. This is fully supported by partnership work of the venues and operators in the saturation zone.

• I have enclosed a statement made by Town centre Inspector Mr. Bates.

My aim is to provide information relating to the problems that we face within the town centre, in order to assist the applicant in providing a better understanding of why the saturation policy was adopted.

The saturation policy along with cumulative impact was designed to assist in promoting the licensing objectives.

I ask the committee not to grant a further licence in the saturation area of the town centre.

• There are no conditions no matter how strict I could recommend to impose to prevent the issues mentioned in this report.

and badly managed. Indeed if you look beyond the proposed venues you also see four betting shops three fast food venues, three charity shops in the 25 metre radius. The questions then is who will frequent this location, what does it offer to the community and what value will a licence add to a small location well served for licensed venues.

I also note that the argument may well be made that this venue can trade as an off licence outside the periods when violence and disorder is greatest. However, it is the sale of cheap alcohol at any time that is the greater problem to ourselves and the licensed trade. Pre loading and effectively drinking cheaper alcohol prior to "going out "or smuggling into a venue is a real problem. The licensed venues in Romford are under significant pressure from us to prevent violence and disorder in their venues. They rightly state that it is common to find degraded smaller spirit bottles in random bag searches and on the floor of their venues. They also report the public often appear fully sober when they attend their venues and then descend very rapidly into drunkenness .It is also common to see off licenses in Romford selling small and single bottles of alcohol. Cynically it seems likely that the off licence trade, profit from this demand. The important thing to note is that the sale can be made at any time of day if the intention of the purchaser is to pre-load.

I would also expect that with this venue there will be the offer undoubtedly of additional training, codes of practice and the national accreditation of various schemes such as challenge 25. They as many other schemes and conditions in a different environment would make a real difference **but not in my experience South Street Romford**. I would also point out that with current "Tesco" venues operating across the borough they are considerable crime generators and in their own rights "Hotspots "for local crime.


I ask therefore that you refuse the granting of this application and understand fully the implication to current crime and disorder if you find in favour of the applicant.
