Members are advised that, when considering application for a premises licence, the following options are available to them by virtue of the Licensing Act 2003, Part 3, section 35, paragraphs 3 and 4:

"Where relevant representations are made, the authority must

- (a) hold a hearing to consider them, unless the authority, the applicant and each person who has made such representations agree that a hearing is unnecessary, and
- (b) having regard to the representations, take such steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

The steps are:

- a) modify the conditions of the licence
- b) reject the whole or part of the application

and for this purpose, the conditions of the licence are modified if any of them is altered or omitted or any new condition is added."

The Sub-Committee will also wish to note that, if none of these steps is required, the application must be granted.

Assuming that the Sub-Committee is satisfied that a hearing is required, then the following procedural steps are recommended. The Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 will govern the arrangements for the hearing of the application now under consideration. This report accords with the requirements of that Act and the Regulations, and in particular Regulations 21-25 (procedure at the hearing).

1. Membership of the Sub-Committee:

- 1.1 The Sub-Committee comprises three members of the Licensing Committee, with a quorum of two members. Unless there are objections, in the absence of three members, the hearing shall proceed with the quorum of two.
- 1.2 A members of the Licensing Committee will be excluded from hearing an application where he or she:
 - 1.2.1 has considered an application in respect of the premises in the previous 12 months as a Member of the Regulatory Services Committee; or
 - 1.2.2 is a Ward Councillor for the Ward in which the premises, subject to the application, are located; or
 - 1.2.3 is a Ward Councillor for a Ward which is likely to be affected by the application or;
 - 1.2.4 has a personal interest in the application.

2. Roles of other participants:

- 2.1 The Legal Advisor is not a party to the hearing. The role of the Legal Advisor is to provide legal advice relating to the application and submissions.
- 2.2 The Clerk is not a party to the hearing. The role of the Clerk is to record the hearing and the decisions of the Sub-Committee, and ensure efficient administration

3. Chairman's Briefing meeting:

- 3.1 Prior to this hearing, the Sub-Committee Chairman will have met the Legal Advisor and/or Clerk to determine whether further clarification is required of any issues contained in the application or any representation.
- 3.2 During this preliminary meeting no decision will have been made or discussion held regarding the substantive merits of the application or representations.

4. Location and facilities:

- 4.1 All hearings will be heard at the Havering Town Hall unless otherwise directed.
- 4.2 Interpreters will be provided by the Council on request, provided notice is given at least five working days before the hearing.

5. Notification of attendance:

5.1 The Chairman will enquire of the parties who is in attendance and the parties will indicate their names (and, where relevant, whom they represent). A register will be circulated before the commencement of the hearing on which the applicant, his/her advisers and companions and all interested parties (and/or their representatives) will be asked to record their attendance.

6. Procedural matters:

- 6.1 Prior to the commencement of the hearing, the Chairman of the Sub-Committee will orally inform the parties whether their applications to have certain people attend the hearing (e.g. witnesses) have been granted or refused. Note this relates to people other than those attending on behalf of a party in the capacity as a representative of the party.
- 6.2 Prior to the commencement of the hearing the Chairman of the Sub-Committee will outline the procedure to be followed at the hearing. This will normally be as follows:

Introduction of the application:

The Licensing officer will outline:

- details of the application and relevant representations received from the parties;
- relevant legislation;
- relevant Licensing Policy; and
- the time limit in which the Council must reach a determination.

Documentary evidence:

- Documentary or other information in support of applications, representations or notices should be provided to the Clerk of the Sub-Committee at least 7 clear working days before the hearing. If this information is produced at the hearing it will only be taken into account by the Sub-Committee if the Sub-Committee and all the parties consent to its submission. Permission to have this information included in the hearing should be requested at the beginning of the hearing before any oral submissions have been made.
- Statements made by people in support of a party's representation who
 are not present at the hearing, must be signed by the maker, dated and
 witnessed by another person. The statement must also contain the
 witness's full name and occupation.

Representations:

- The chairman will invite each of the parties at the hearing or their representative sequentially to address the Sub-Committee and call any person/s to whom permission has been granted to appear. Each party will be allowed a maximum period of 10 minutes in which to address the Sub-Committee and call persons on his/her behalf.
- This 10 minute period is where each party has the opportunity to orally address the Sub-Committee and clarify any points in which the Sub-Committee has sought clarification prior to the hearing. This 10 minute period should be uninterrupted unless a member of the Sub-Committee or Legal Advisor considers that the speaker is making submissions that are irrelevant, frivolous or vexatious.
- Members of the Sub-Committee may ask questions of any party, at any time during the proceedings. Time taken in dealing with a Member's question will not be taken into account in determining the length of time available to the party in question to make their representation.

The sequence in which each of the parties will be invited to address the Sub-Committee will normally be in the order of:

- the Chief Officer of Police;
- the Fire Authority;
- the Health and Safety at Work Enforcing Authority;
- the Local Planning Authority;
- the Local environmental Health Authority;
- the Local Weights and Measures Authority;
- the Authority Responsible for the Protection of Children from Harm;
- a navigation or other authority responsible for waterways; and
- any other party that has submitted representations in respect of the application, certificate, notice or other matter appearing before the Sub-Committee:
- the party that has submitted the application, certificate, notice or other matter appearing before the Sub-Committee.

At the discretion of the Sub-Committee the above order may be varied.

Cross-Examination:

Where witnesses have been permitted by the Sub-Committee to speak at the hearing on behalf of a party, permission must be sought from the Sub-Committee before another party can ask the witness questions. This process of questioning is normally referred to as cross-examination. The Sub-Committee will allow cross-examination only where it is necessary to assist it in considering the representations or application.

Relevance:

Information submitted at the hearing must be relevant to the applications, representations, or notice and the promotion of the licensing objectives. The Chairman of the Sub-Committee is entitled to exclude any information it considers to be irrelevant whether presented in written or oral form. The licensing objectives are:

The prevention of crime and disorder;

Public safety;

The prevention of public nuisance; and

The protection of children from harm.

7. Failure of parties to attend the hearing:

7.1 If a party, who has not given prior notice of his/her intention not to attend the hearing, is absent from the hearing the Sub-Committee may either adjourn the hearing or hold the hearing in the party's absence. Where the hearing is held in the absence of a party, the Sub-Committee will still consider the application, representation or notice submitted by that party.

8. Adjournments and extension of time:

- 8.1 The Sub-Committee may adjourn a hearing to a specified date or extend a notice period except where it must make a determination within certain time limits in the following specific applications:
 - Review of premises licences following closure orders where the Subcommittee must make a determination within 28 days of receiving notice of the closure order.

9. Sub-Committee's determination of the hearing:

- 9.1 At the conclusion of the hearing the Sub-Committee will deliberate in private accompanied by the Clerk and the Legal Advisor who will be available to assist the Sub-Committee with any legal problems but will not participate in any decision making of the Sub-Committee.
- 9.2 The Sub-Committee will normally make its determination and announce its decision at the end of the hearing.
- 9.3 Where all parties have notified the Sub-Committee that a hearing is not required the Sub-Committee must make its determination within 10 working days of being given notice that the hearing is not required.

10. Power to exclude people from hearing:

- 10.1 The public are entitled to attend the hearing as spectators. However, the Sub-Committee may exclude any person from the hearing including any person assisting or representing a party where:
 - it considers that the public interest would be best served by excluding the public or the individual person from the hearing; or
 - that person is behaving in a disruptive manner. This may include a party
 who is seeking to be heard at the hearing. In the case where a party is to
 be excluded, the party may submit to the Sub-Committee in writing any
 information which they would have been entitled to give orally had they
 not been required to leave the hearing.

11. Recording of proceedings:

11.1 A written record of the hearing will be produced and kept for 6 years from the date of the determination of the hearing.

12. Power to vary procedure:

12.1 The Sub-committee may depart from following any of the procedures set out in this document if it considers the departure to be necessary in order to consider an application, notice or representation.

This application for a premises licence is made by Mr Adil Haziri under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003. The application was received by Havering's Licensing Authority on 30th December 2013.

Geographical description of the area and description of the building

9 Oak Road is located in a parade of seven shops immediately adjacent to Harold Wood Station. The premises is detached and to its rear are railway tracks. The rest of the vicinity is predominantly residential although there are a number of other commercial outlets in the neighbourhood.

Comments and observations on the application

The applicant acted in accordance with regulations 25 and 26 of *The Licensing Act 2003 (Premises licences and club premises certificates) Regulations 2005* relating to the advertising of the application. The required public notice was installed in the 10th January 2014 edition of the Yellow Advertiser.

The premises has had A3 planning consent in place since 2011. The Town and Country Planning (Use Classes) Order 1987 defines A3 usage as Restaurants and cafés - For the sale of food and drink for consumption on the premises - restaurants, snack bars and cafes. This licensing application is appropriate to the premises' planning consent.

Under the provisions of the previous Licensing Act 1964 restaurant premises would have been permitted a 'supper hours certificate' allowing the supply of hot food accompanied by alcohol until 00:00. Alcohol supply hours would have been deregulated on New Year's Eve to permit alcohol supplies to be made from opening time on New Year's Eve to closing time on New Year's Day.

Summary

There were eleven representations against this application from interested persons.

There was one representation of support for this application from interested person.

There were no representations against this application from any responsible authority.

Details of representations

Valid representations may only address the following licensing objectives:

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- The prevention of public nuisance
- The protection of children from harm
- Public safety

Interested persons' representations

The interested persons' representations against this application are based upon the prevention of public nuisance licensing objective.

The nearest representor to the premises lives approximately fifty metres away while the furthest lives approximately half a kilometre away.





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

Paul - please find below my objections to the application for 9 oak road to sell alcohol.

A licence to sell alcohol throughout the day and into the evening will create air pollution as people socialise outside (to smoke / consume alcohol) or when leaving / arriving at the premises. Loud voices, the slamming of car doors etc will undoubtedly effect noise levels and disturb the local residents, who are mostly families and the elderly. If alcohol is sold on the premises through the day and evening and customers are leaving drunk or late at night, creating noise, this is unsuitable for a residential area.

There is already an issue with parking in Oak road which will increase with the activity of 9 Oak Roads customers. It is often a hazard pulling into Oak road from Gubbins Lane and only last week I was witness to an accident while someone pulled out from the cafe (I believe it was the Cafe owner!) who didn't see a car already coming along Oak road. As a busy residential road with a lot of pedestrians (commuters and school children) can you please advise what parking provisions will be made for Oak road and the surrounding area to accommodate the additional traffic 9 Oak road cafe will create? What provisions have been made for additional deliveries to this premises as already the lorry's that deliver to the newsagent in Oak road cause quite some distraction and disturbance to passing traffic?

Furthermore the standard of the neighbour hood has deteriorated considerably in the 12 years I have lived in Fitzilian Ave and I have no doubt that an establishment selling alcohol in the area till late at night will add to this. For example there are often youths hanging around at the garage on the corner of Oak / Athelston which will certainly increase when a premises is selling alcohol less than 100m away. The noise of them chatting / laughing / arguing, with increased numbers who may have wandered from an alcohol selling establishment will contribute further to disturbing the residents (and in my case my young daughter who is trying to sleep).

Additionally there has been an increase in crime in the area of late and an establishment of this nature, so close to residential homes, will surely contribute to this. A few months ago there was a rape behind the shops next to 9+ Oak road and last night my car was broken into (I live at 3 Fitzilian ave). What will be done to monitor and eradicate any further crime should it occur? If crime rises can the Cafe have its alcohol licence taken away? Have crime figures been considered in any decisions taken by the council about this application?

I would be interested to know how such a licence can be granted when there is clearly huge concern to the local residents. Can you please explain how or why those that have invested in the area (us residents) do not have a say in changes that effect our street / neighbour hood? A cafe selling meals and no alcoholic drinks during day time hours would have been a modest and pleasant addition to the area, but how does it get permission to have such long hours and allow alcohol to be served to such extended hours?

Dear Mr Jones,

I am writing to state why I believe it is not in the best interest of the community for a license for 9 Oak Road to be granted; especially a license with late night hours.

The main reason for my objections to the license are listed below which falls under public safety and public nuisance.

No one wants to stop local business opening but it is a residential area and it is unnecessary to have a license from 11.00-23.00 and even later on Valentines day, Christmas Eve, NYE and All Bank holidays. It would be irresponsible to allow the premises to serve alcohol for such long hours when on Havering's council website it states 'Havering has around 3320 'dependent' drinkers and 20,000 'high-risk' drinkers. This means that, out of Havering's adult drinking population, 6.9% are classified as 'high risk' drinkers, while an estimated 19.4% are 'increasing risk' drinkers'.

The long hours are not in the interest of public safety and is likely to cause public nuisance when people leave the premises so late. The application states only serving alcohol with a meal; which means the license does not need to be so late because who goes out for a meal at 10pm? This suggests as long as they have bought a meal in the evening there is nothing stoping them from sitting in there getting drunk until closing. Which would cause a noise nuisance when they leave and also unsocial behavior. For example urinating in the street after leaving the cafe, litter, Yobbish behavior, vandalism, graffiti, shouting, screaming or swearing, hanging round in groups and causing a nuisance and possible threats of violence to people or property.

The cafe is in a small residential road which is surrounded by homes and an old peoples home is directly opposite. Having a license until 23:00 will mean there is no escaping disturbances or noise in the evening.

The Cafe is situated on a road which has parking restrictions which means there are no parking facilities for people visiting the premises.

There will be extra congestion within the road itself due to people being picked up and dropped off at the cafe. This is an issue for public safety and will also cause extra noise disturbance.

I do not feel the cafe having a license until 23.00 and later on the days I set out above will help to develop the community or enhance it in anyway. I ask this body not to grant this license, so as to keep the peace and quiet for the residence of this highly populated area.

We are writing in response to the proposed development of 9, Oak Road as a café with license.

We object in the strongest terms against this development, in particular the license and the proposed licensing hours for the following reasons:

- a)The proposed licensing hours seem hugely excessive, taking into account the previous history of the premises (armed raids etc) and recent ever increasing crime in the immediate vicinity (including rape, burglary and knife crime). This premises is right by Harold Wood Station and as such will undoubtedly attract latecomers from e.g. Romford nightclubs. These people already cause disruption in the area and will be encouraged to do so further by such long licensing hours. The nearest premises with a license closes at 8 pm and even this results in bottles, cans etc being dumped outside nearby residential premises a longer license, particularly one which permits alcohol to be taken off premises would encourage this further.
- b) It is already an unsafe area at night. To put in place a late night establishment will encourage more inebriated behavior in the area. It is already the case that people are accosted in this area by inebriates, beggars and those with a drug problem we already accommodate half way houses for those with drug and alcohol dependence and flats for young offenders from which have been a high level of police callouts such a premises would most certainly encourage inappropriate behaviours to escalate.
- c) Almost directly opposite this proposed establishment is an old people's home and the rest of the area is residential, housing many disabled and vulnerable people as well as many young families with children. To allow such a premises will cause a public nuisance in terms of i) excessive licensed opening hours iii) traffic nuisance this is a restricted parking area so extra traffic will of necessity affect adjoining streets.

In addition, the existing pavement areas are narrow but serve a huge number of residents and/or commuters – this pavement traffic is already intense but to increase this further would most certainly constitute a public nuisance.

d) This small area is already well served by at least five premises with varying limited licensing hours – a pub, a restaurant and three shops, at least two of which have long opening hours (e.g. up to 10 pm). To permit any further license in the area will attract unacceptable behavior and change the nature of the area. We find it most shocking that a premises in this area be allowed 11am to 11pm licensed opening on any day of the week- these are times for central London and central Romford clubs, not a quiet residential area, since the opening hours alone

will cause public nuisance. The proposed license is effectively one for a public house, not a café, because it permits alcohol to be consumed off premises – this therefore we feel to be deeply inappropriate.

e) Finally, it is deeply worrying that such a premises could be allowed on a concourse used by hundreds if not thousands of schoolchildren every day – by definition of its position, this would be on a main thoroughfare used by countless children attending school in Harold Wood, Brentwood, Romford and further afield every school day and for leisure purposes at weekends. It simply is not safe to have such a premises in this area. The existing premises that are licensed are already subject to gang attacks, e.g. the Coop, due to drunkenness and drug use. To license yet another premises in this area will encourage more inappropriate and criminal behavior and further endanger residents and their children.
