Subject Heading: Procedure for the Hearing: Licensing Act 2003

Members are advised that, when considering an application to vary a premises licence, the following options are available to them by virtue of the Licensing Act 2003, Part 3, section 35, paragraphs 3 and 4:

"Where relevant representations are made, the authority must

- (a) hold a hearing to consider them, unless the authority, the applicant and each person who has made such representations agree that a hearing is unnecessary, and
- (b) having regard to the representations, take such steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives.

The steps are:

- a) modify the conditions of the licence
- b) reject the whole or part of the application

and for this purpose, the conditions of the licence are modified if any of them is altered or omitted or any new condition is added."

The Sub-Committee will also wish to note that, if none of these steps is required, the application must be granted.

Assuming that the Sub-Committee is satisfied that a hearing is required, then the following procedural steps are recommended. The Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 will govern the arrangements for the hearing of the application now under consideration. This report accords with the requirements of that Act and the Regulations, and in particular Regulations 21-25 (procedure at the hearing).

1. Membership of the Sub-Committee:

- 1.1 The Sub-Committee comprises three members of the Licensing Committee, with a quorum of two members. Unless there are objections, in the absence of three members, the hearing shall proceed with the quorum of two.
- 1.2 A members of the Licensing Committee will be excluded from hearing an application where he or she:
 - 1.2.1 has considered an application in respect of the premises in the previous 12 months as a Member of the Regulatory Services Committee: or
 - 1.2.2 is a Ward Councillor for the Ward in which the premises, subject to the application, are located; or
 - 1.2.3 is a Ward Councillor for a Ward which is likely to be affected by the application or;
 - 1.2.4 has a personal interest in the application.

2. Roles of other participants:

- 2.1 The Legal Advisor is not a party to the hearing. The role of the Legal Advisor is to provide legal advice relating to the application and submissions.
- 2.2 The Clerk is not a party to the hearing. The role of the Clerk is to record the hearing and the decisions of the Sub-Committee, and ensure efficient administration

3. Chairman's Briefing meeting:

- 3.1 Prior to this hearing, the Sub-Committee Chairman will have met the Legal Advisor and/or Clerk to determine whether further clarification is required of any issues contained in the application or any representation.
- 3.2 During this preliminary meeting no decision will have been made or discussion held regarding the substantive merits of the application or representations.

4. Location and facilities:

- 4.1 All hearings will be heard at the Havering Town Hall unless otherwise directed.
- 4.2 Interpreters will be provided by the Council on request, provided notice is given at least five working days before the hearing.

5. Notification of attendance:

5.1 The Chairman will enquire of the parties who is in attendance and the parties will indicate their names (and, where relevant, whom they represent). A register will be circulated before the commencement of the hearing on which the applicant, his/her advisers and companions and all interested parties (and/or their representatives) will be asked to record their attendance.

6. Procedural matters:

- 6.1 Prior to the commencement of the hearing, the Chairman of the Sub-Committee will orally inform the parties whether their applications to have certain people attend the hearing (e.g. witnesses) have been granted or refused. Note this relates to people other than those attending on behalf of a party in the capacity as a representative of the party.
- 6.2 Prior to the commencement of the hearing the Chairman of the Sub-Committee will outline the procedure to be followed at the hearing. This will normally be as follows:

Introduction of the application:

The Licensing officer will outline:

- details of the application and relevant representations received from the parties;
- relevant legislation;
- relevant Licensing Policy; and
- the time limit in which the Council must reach a determination.

Documentary evidence:

- Documentary or other information in support of applications, representations or notices should be provided to the Clerk of the Sub-Committee at least 5 clear working days before the hearing. If this information is produced at the hearing it will only be taken into account by the Sub-Committee if the Sub-Committee and all the parties consent to its submission. Permission to have this information included in the hearing should be requested at the beginning of the hearing before any oral submissions have been made.
- Statements made by people in support of a party's representation who are not present at the hearing, must be signed by the maker, dated and witnessed by another person. The statement must also contain the witness's full name and occupation.

Representations:

- The chairman will invite each of the parties at the hearing or their representative sequentially to address the Sub-Committee and call any person/s to whom permission has been granted to appear. Each party will be allowed a maximum period of 10 minutes in which to address the Sub-Committee and call persons on his/her behalf.
- This 10 minute period is where each party has the opportunity to orally address the Sub-Committee and clarify any points in which the Sub-Committee has sought clarification prior to the hearing. This 10 minute period should be uninterrupted unless a member of the Sub-Committee or Legal Advisor considers that the speaker is making submissions that are irrelevant, frivolous or vexatious.
- Members of the Sub-Committee may ask questions of any party, at any time during the proceedings. Time taken in dealing with a Member's question will not be taken into account in determining the length of time available to the party in question to make their representation.

The sequence in which each of the parties will be invited to address the Sub-Committee will normally be in the order of:

- the Chief Officer of Police;
- the Fire Authority;
- the Health and Safety at Work Enforcing Authority;
- the Local Planning Authority;
- the Local environmental Health Authority;
- the Local Weights and Measures Authority;
- the Authority Responsible for the Protection of Children from Harm:
- a navigation or other authority responsible for waterways; and
- any other party that has submitted representations in respect of the application, certificate, notice or other matter appearing before the Sub-Committee;
- the party that has submitted the application, certificate, notice or other matter appearing before the Sub-Committee.

At the discretion of the Sub-Committee the above order may be varied.

Cross-Examination:

Where witnesses have been permitted by the Sub-Committee to speak at the hearing on behalf of a party, permission must be sought from the Sub-Committee before another party can ask the witness questions. This process of questioning is normally referred to as cross-examination. The Sub-Committee will allow cross-examination only

where it is necessary to assist it in considering the representations or application.

Relevance:

Information submitted at the hearing must be relevant to the applications, representations, or notice and the promotion of the licensing objectives. The Chairman of the Sub-Committee is entitled to exclude any information it considers to be irrelevant whether presented in written or oral form. The licensing objectives are:

The prevention of crime and disorder;
Public safety;
The prevention of public nuisance; and
The protection of children from harm.

7. Failure of parties to attend the hearing:

7.1 If a party, who has not given prior notice of his/her intention not to attend the hearing, is absent from the hearing the Sub-Committee may either adjourn the hearing or hold the hearing in the party's absence. Where the hearing is held in the absence of a party, the Sub-Committee will still consider the application, representation or notice submitted by that party.

8. Adjournments and extension of time:

- 8.1 The Sub-Committee may adjourn a hearing to a specified date or extend a notice period except where it must make a determination within certain time limits in the following specific applications:
 - Review of premises licences following closure orders where the Sub-committee must make a determination within 28 days of receiving notice of the closure order.

9. Sub-Committee's determination of the hearing:

- 9.1 At the conclusion of the hearing the Sub-Committee will deliberate in private accompanied by the Clerk and the Legal Advisor who will be available to assist the Sub-Committee with any legal problems but will not participate in any decision making of the Sub-Committee.
- 9.2 The Sub-Committee will normally make its determination and announce its decision at the end of the hearing.

9.3 Where all parties have notified the Sub-Committee that a hearing is not required the Sub-Committee must make its determination within 10 working days of being given notice that the hearing is not required.

10. Power to exclude people from hearing:

- 10.1 The public are entitled to attend the hearing as spectators. However, the Sub-Committee may exclude any person from the hearing including any person assisting or representing a party where:
 - it considers that the public interest would be best served by excluding the public or the individual person from the hearing; or
 - that person is behaving in a disruptive manner. This may include a
 party who is seeking to be heard at the hearing. In the case where a
 party is to be excluded, the party may submit to the Sub-Committee
 in writing any information which they would have been entitled to
 give orally had they not been required to leave the hearing.

11. Recording of proceedings:

11.1 A written record of the hearing will be produced and kept for 6 years from the date of the determination of the hearing.

12. Power to vary procedure:

12.1 The Sub-committee may depart from following any of the procedures set out in this document if it considers the departure to be necessary in order to consider an application, notice or representation.

This application for a variation to a premises licence is made by Malthurst Petroleum Limited under section 34 of the Licensing Act 2003. The application was received by Havering's Licensing Authority on 25 February 2016.

Geographical description of the area and description of the building

The premise is a garage forecourt with attached convenience store. It is located on the Colchester Road, near the junction with Woodstock Avenue. Although situated on a main arterial road, it is neighbours with residential properties situated mainly in There are residential properties on the other side of the Woodstock Avenue. carriageway.

Colchester Road is one of the main arterial routes (A12) between London and Essex giving access to the M25.

The premises is the last roadside property heading eastbound before the slip road to the M25.

Details of the application

The current licence holder has been in place at the premises since October 2015. There is a premises licence which allows licensable activity as:-

The premise is already open for 24 hours a day and is seeking to bring the alcohol sales in line with their current operation times.

Comments and observations on the application

The applicant acted in accordance with regulations 25 and 26 of *The Licensing Act 2003 (Premises licences and club premises certificates) Regulations 2005* relating to the advertising of the application. The required public notice was installed in the Romford Recorder on the 4 March 2016.

The premises is contained within an area that has been designated a Cumulative Impact Area in Havering's Statement of Licensing Policy 3 which came into force on the 7 January 2016.

Licensing Policy 3

The Licensing Authority has adopted a special policy relating to cumulative impact in relation to

Harold Hill

This policy creates a rebuttable presumption that applications for new premises licences, club premises certificates, or variation applications specifically for off sales only that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will be refused, unless the applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact and not impact adversely on the promotion of the licensing objectives.

During the consultation period, the applicant submitted the below conditions as an addition to the operating schedule.

- 1. All staff engaged or to be engaged in the sale of alcohol on the premises shall receive the following training in age restricted sales:
 - Induction training which must be completed and documented prior to the sale of alcohol by the staff member.
 - Refresher/reinforcement training at intervals of no more than 6 months.
 - Training records will be available for inspection by a police officer or other authorised officer on request
- 2. All cashiers shall be trained to record refusals of sales of alcohol in a refusals book/register. The book/register will contain:
- details of the time and date the refusal was made:
- the identity of the staff member refusing the sale;
- details of the alcohol the person attempted to purchase.
 - This book/register will be available for inspection by a police officer or other authorised officer on request
- 3. An incident book/register shall be maintained to record:

- All incidents of crime and disorder occurring at the premises
- Details of occasions when the police are called to the premises

 This book/register will be available for inspection by a police officer or other authorised officer on request.
- 4. There shall be no self-service of spirits except for spirit mixtures.
- 5. There shall be no sale of single cans of beer, lager or cider from the premises.
- 6. There will be no sale of beer, lager or cider with an ABV over 5.5%.

Summary

 - (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 3. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - (2) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
 - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either—
 - (a) a holographic mark, or
 - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 4. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
- 5. For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 4
 - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
 - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula P=D+(DxV)

where —

- (i) P is the permitted price,
- (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
- (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence —

Mandatory conditions – contd.

- (i) the holder of the premises licence,
- (ii) the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;
- (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- (e) "value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 6. Where the permitted price given by paragraph (b) of paragraph 5 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 7. (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by paragraph (b) of paragraph 5 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
 - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Annex 2 - conditions consistent with the operating schedule

- 1. A 'Challenge 25' policy in relation to alcohol supplies shall be operated at the premises; acceptable forms of proof of age shall be a passport, a photo card driving licence or a 'PASS' accredited identification card.
- 2. All spirits shall be located behind the counter.
- 3. A CCTV system which is fit for purpose shall be maintained at the premises. The system shall incorporate a camera covering the entrance door and shall be capable of providing an image which is regarded as 'identification standard' of people entering and leaving the premises. The CCTV system shall also incorporate a recording facility and images shall be securely stored for a minimum of 28 days. The system shall be operational during all times that the premises is open for licensable activities.
- 4. The premises shall maintain 11 fully fitted digital cameras which shall cover the premises and forecourt.
- 5. Authorised staff shall be trained in the operation and usage of the CCTV system including downloading images in order that they can be shown to Police with a minimum of delay when requested.
- 6. Staff involved with the sale of alcohol shall be trained with regard to their responsibilities in the retail sale of alcohol. Refresher training shall be undertaken as per company policy and records of staff training shall be

kept at the site and shall be made available to authorised officers of a relevant responsible authority upon reasonable request.


- 7. Prominent notices shall be displayed at the entrance to the premises and at the point of sale advising customers that they will be asked to produce proof of their age. Notices shall also be displayed regarding the supply of alcohol to minors.
- 8. Refusal of alcohol sales shall be recorded in the refusal log which shall be kept on site. The information recorded in the refusal log shall include the date and time of refusal, description of the person refused service and the reason for refusal.



Objection summary: The application is in opposition to a number of Havering's licensing policies and as such has the potential to negatively impact upon the promotion of the licensing objectives, in particular the prevention of public nuisance.

Policy considerations:

Licensing Policy 1

In considering applications for new licences, variations to existing licences and licence reviews the Licensing Authority will take the matters listed below into account:

- whether the premises is located in an area of cumulative impact:
- the type of premises and their cumulative impact on the area and the mix of premises in the area:
- the location of the premises and the character of the area;
- the views of the responsible authorities;
- the views of other persons;
- past compliance history of current management;
- the proposed hours of operation;
- the type and number of customers likely to attend the premises;
- whether the applicant is able to demonstrate commitment to a high standard of management, for example through active participation in the Safe & Sound meetings and Pubwatch.

Licensing Policy 3

The Licensing Authority has adopted a special policy relating to cumulative impact in relation to

Harold Hill

This policy creates a rebuttable presumption that applications for new premises licences, club premises certificates, or variation applications specifically for off sales only that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will be refused, unless the applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact and not impact adversely on the promotion of the licensing objectives.

Licensing Policy 5

The Licensing Authority is concerned regarding the adverse impact on the licensing objectives arising from the increasing numbers of shops selling alcohol for consumption off the premises. The Licensing Authority will consider restricting the number of premises and the licensing hours to 23:00 in locations where longer hours undermine the licensing objectives.

Licensing Policy 7

When dealing with new and variation applications the Licensing Authority will give more favourable consideration to applications with the following closing times:

Public Houses and Bars 23:00 Sunday to Thursday

00:00 Friday and Saturday

Nightclubs 01:00 Sunday to Thursday

02:00 Friday and Saturday

Restaurants and Cafes 23:00 Sunday to Thursday

00:00 Friday and Saturday

Off licences 23:00 Monday to Sunday

Hot food and drink supplied by

takeaways, fast food premises 00:00 Sunday to Thursday

01:00 Friday and Saturday

Hotel residents only 24 hours sale of alcohol for on sales only

Consideration will also be given to the type of area that the premises is located in with regulated activities normally being permitted until 23:30 in residential areas and 00:30 in mixed use areas.

These hours are not pre-determined and each application will be considered on its merits.

Licensing Policy 14

The Licensing Authority is committed to protecting the amenity of residents and businesses in the vicinity of licenced premises, particularly when late hours have been sought. Where relevant representations are received the Licensing Authority will impose appropriate restrictions or controls on the licence to support the prevention of undue noise disturbance from licensed premises.

Representation

This application to vary a premises licence seeks to extend the hours during which alcohol may be sold to enable 24 hour alcohol supplies seven days a week. The current alcohol supply hours are 06:00 to 23:00 daily. The premises' opening hours are 24 hours a day. The application has been assessed with Havering's licensing policy as a guidance tool. This assessment suggests the application might appear to conflict with a number of Havering's licensing polices which I have detailed above. As such this licensing authority would be unable to support such an application.

The Guidance to the Act indicates at para. 10.15 that

Shops, stores and supermarkets should normally be free to provide sales of alcohol for consumption off the premises at any times when the retail outlet is open for shopping unless there are good reasons, based on the licensing objectives, for restricting those hours.

The Guidance provides that a premises which is open for 24 hours should normally be free to sell alcohol during the full range of its opening hours. That is, *unless there are good reasons, based upon the licensing objectives, for restricting those hours.* It is the view of this Licensing Authority that, for the reasons which follow, there are good reasons to restrict alcohol supply hours at this venue.

Licensing Policy 1

- This premises is located in one of Havering's special policy areas in relation to cumulative impact.
- The premises is located in an area which is almost entirely residential.
- The hours of intended operation are outside those guideline hours Havering has identified as favourable.

Based upon these considerations it might appear that this Licensing Authority has reasonable grounds on which to base opposition to this application.

Licensing Policy 3

Havering's 2016 licensing policy has created a new cumulative impact zone (CIZ) via the creation of Licensing Policy 3 in which this premises is located. Although the premises is located on the very edge of the CIZ it is still within the ambit of the CIZ and hence the policy. As such the policy's requirement upon an applicant is to demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact and not impact adversely on the promotion of the licensing objectives. To this end the applicant has provided the following statement:

Statement

The applicant has considered the Statement of Licensing Policy and is satisfied that the grant of the variation application, with the conditions offered, is unlikely to add to the cumulative impact referenced in the Policy.

There might appear to be little apparent evidence within this brief statement to demonstrate why the applicant is of the view that the application is unlikely to impact adversely upon cumulative impact in the area. One might be of the opinion that while the applicant appears to be satisfied that the grant of this application is unlikely to add to cumulative impact it might seem more pertinent that the Licensing Authority is able to hold a similar view. This statement provides little persuasive reassurance in this regard.

The Guidance to the Act also indicates the expectations placed upon applicants further to premises licence applications and the steps required to promote the licensing objectives in paras. 8.33 to 8.41. Para 8.39 seems particularly explicit in this regard:

Applicants are expected to provide licensing authorities with sufficient information in this section to determine the extent to which their proposed steps are appropriate to promote the licensing objectives in the local area. Applications must not be based on providing a set of standard conditions to promote the licensing objectives and applicants are expected to make it clear why the steps they are proposing are appropriate for the premises.

Havering's Licensing Policy 3 is in accordance with the aims of this paragraph.

Licensing Policy 5

Clearly the aims of this policy relate to those of Licensing Policy 3. While this premises is already permitted to sell alcohol and thus will not constitute an addition to the number of licensed premises in the area, the hours sought would appear to be outside the policy's guideline terminal hour of 23:00.

Licensing Policy 7

This policy addresses terminal hours and indicates that *more favourable consideration* will be given to applications which seek to retain terminal hours as indicated. This application effectively seeks to do away with terminal hours as the application is for alcohol supplies to be permitted 24 hours a day. One might reasonably expect, therefore, that some form of justification would be provided to rationalise this.

The applicant's *Statement* to which I referred previously might be the only justification from which we may extract meaning. The *Statement* appears to suggest that the conditions offered are sufficient mitigation to support the application for 24 hour alcohol sales. Such a position might appear to place the onus upon the responsible authorities to construct an argument to support the grant of the application based upon the proposed conditions. Licensing Policy 3, however, makes it clear that it is incumbent upon the applicant to demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact and not impact adversely on the promotion of the licensing objectives. We might reasonably ask ourselves whether the applicant's *Statement* and proposed conditions succeed to this end.

Licensing Policy 14

This policy is designed to protect the amenity of residents and businesses in the vicinity of licenced premises, particularly when late hours have been sought. Clearly, late alcohol supply hours have been sought at this location. The applicant has proposed a series of measures broadly aimed at preventing crime and disorder and protecting children from harm; however, what measures might be proposed which relate directly to the amenity of the residential properties which abut this premises? I am of course referring to the prevention of public nuisance.

A reasonable person might adopt a *live-and-let-live* approach to any activity if it has the potential to impose little or no adverse impact upon his or her amenity. To this end we might reasonably expect this application to provide measures to mitigate the potential for public nuisance further to 24 hour alcohol supply and, in particular, those late night/early morning hours sought in addition to those already permissible. The application proposes the following:

Adequate waste receptacles for use by customers shall be provided in and immediately outside the premises.

Based upon this one might reasonably conclude that any risk assessment which may have been conducted by the applicant further to public nuisance considerations foresaw only the potential for litter problems attendant to 24 hour alcohol supplies. While one may argue that the conditions proposed *in totality* might further the promotion of all four licensing objectives one might have expected a more robust approach specifically aimed at the prevention of public nuisance, given the location of this premises in a CIZ. The Guidance to the Act indicates at para 2.14 that public nuisance issues extend beyond litter concerns as they

will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.

While the Guidance to the Act indicates at para. 1.17 that it is

essential to avoid the imposition of disproportionate and overly burdensome conditions on premises where there is no need for such conditions

one might reasonably have expected greater consideration to have been given to the promotion of this particular licensing objective. To reiterate, the onus is upon the applicant to demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact and not impact adversely on the promotion of the licensing objectives. The applicant must be explicit when submitting an application which appears contrary to the Licensing Authority's stated policies; it is not for responsible authorities to infer meaning where meaning might appear less than explicit.

Conclusion

Based upon the merits of this application – an application which appears to come into conflict with a number of Havering's licensing policies, in particular Licensing Policy 3 – this Licensing Authority is unable to support the application as submitted and subsequently modified on 1st March 2016. We are of the view that the applicant has failed to demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will *not* add to the cumulative impact and *not* impact adversely on the promotion of the licensing objectives. We therefore suggest that the application has not met an appropriate threshold to enable this Licensing Authority to depart from the stated aims of Licensing Policy 3. We respectfully request that the Licensing Sub-Committee declines to grant the application.

Police Representation to the Application to vary a Premises Licence at Harold Park Service Station, Colchester Road, Romford, RM3 0AG.

I certify that I have considered the application shown above and I wish to make representations that the likely effect of the grant of the application is detrimental to the Licensing Objectives for the reasons indicated below.

- 1. The prevention of crime and disorder,
- 2. Public safety,

The applicant has requested that conditions be removed from Annex 2 of the current licence; these conditions are considered to be proportionate and relevant to the licensing objectives.

The Prevention of Crime and Disorder

The venue is located within a Cumulative Impact Zone, it is within walking distance from a high concentration of residential areas which suffer from high levels of crime and disorder.

The Office for National Statistics detail that violent incidents which involve alcohol increase from 23% between 1200-1800 to 54% between 1800 - 2200 up to an average of **83.5%** between **2200 - 0600**.

Creating a single outlet for the off-sale of alcohol after 11pm in the cumulative impact zone would inevitably create a focal point, this would be most concerning at the weekends especially after the various public houses in the area close.

The ONS statistics show that 64% of violent incidents involving alcohol occur between strangers. The majority of which occur at the weekend between the hours of 2200 and 0600.

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The application primarily details CCTV conditions which the applicant has offered.

The request for removal of conditions in annex 2 relating to staff training presents a concern in the ability for staff members to be able to identify customers likely to cause disorder in the immediate vicinity, especially late at night.

Public Safety

The applicant details that staffing levels will be adequate and will be disclosed on request to the relevant authorities.

This is non-specific and no rationale behind how numbers will be calculated is given. It is a concern that public safety could be compromised by the operators reducing staffing levels to cut costs.

There is no mention in the application of any alternative options such as hatch service after the current terminal hour.

I am writing to you to appeal against the extended opening hours for the Harold Park Service Station.

First we already have one planning application currently being reviewed for the back of my house – a cemetery. Now you wish to compromise my family life even more by allowing the petrol station 2 doors away from my house to serve alcohol!? I am assuming that when the value of my home decreases because of these two proposals (if they go through) you will be offering me compensation!?

How can you think it is acceptable to serve alcohol from a petrol station where people are driving? If you look into the police reports of incidents at this petrol garage you will see that on a regular occurrence police are called to disturbance's there late at night. Every single Friday and Saturday night without fail I am woken by drunk people in this garage, fighting and abusing the staff there. There was also an incident recently when there police attended where two cars of males were fighting and ones of the cars was smashed to pieces with a baseball bat. All of this is visible from my bedroom window and wakes me and my family up constantly. When my daughter was a newborn she was unable to sleep in my room due to the noise! If it is not the customers making noise then it is the petrol filing tankers delivering at 3, 4, 5am and banging and clattering to wake the whole street up. If this licence extension is to go ahead — do you plan on building a noise prevention barrier!?

I ask you to seriously consider the repercussions of this proposal as all I can see is it causing the police to attend this petrol station on a more regular basis than they already do.
