STATEMENT OF THE REASONS FOR THE DECISION

The plan and its delivery is a statutory requirement and must be approved by elected members or delegated to officer level for approval. The adoption and implementation of the plan will ensure that the London Borough of Havering complies with that requirement.

Communities, Places, Opportunities, Connections links

Communities, Interventions identified in this plan will help protect residents from the implications of poor food hygiene in food premises, rogue traders and scams intended to mislead the consumer.

An integral element of food safety intervention is the **opportunity** to educate food business operators by providing face to face information, often on a one to one basis or directing them to sources of information or educational courses to improve knowledge of food safety. This helps to reduce the potential risk of food poisonings and production of unsafe foods. The service is often the only contact a small business has with regulators and the only access to accurate technical advice.

The service advises consumers of their rights and the outcomes of investigations. This assists them to do the right thing, the food hygiene rating system allows people to make lifestyle choices about the places they eat food from.

We ensure that we offer consistent advice and enforcement, so that no food or feed

business can gain a competitive advantage over another by failing to comply with legislation designed to protect consumers.

Places, Food and feed safety interventions help to ensure that businesses within the Borough operate from premises that are structurally sound and well maintained and ensure that they identify the specific risks in their business and implement management systems to control the risk to an acceptable level. It is accepted by Central Government that intervention of this nature is likely to contribute to a reduction in food poisoning and in a reduction in adulteration of food which creates improvements in information for consumers and control of infectious diseases.

Connections; internal liaison with other departments, regional and national liaison with other local authorities and Government departments. Digitally delivering services wherever possible, enhancing mobile working to improve efficiency.

Primary authority and traded consultancy services help businesses comply with food law and in so doing to help them to prosper.

LEGAL IMPLICATIONS AND RISKS

Section 6 of The Food Safety Act 1990 and Food Safety and Hygiene (England) Regulations 2013 place a duty and responsibility upon the London Borough of Havering to act as food authority and competent authority for official controls as laid out in Regulation (EC) No 882/2004 of the European Parliament and of the Council. The 1990 Act requires the Council to give effect to the provisions of the Act. Section 40 of the Food Safety Act 1990 enables Codes of Practice to be issued for the guidance of Food and Competent Authorities to which they must have regard. There are also similar responsibilities relating to infectious disease control found in the Public Health Act 2006. The Food Standards Agency has a monitoring and regulatory role to ensure food authorities comply with their statutory obligations.

The annual Food Law Service Plan is produced to comply with the Food Law Code of Practice.

EQUALITIES AND SOCIAL INCLUSION IMPLICATIONS AND RISKS

The Council is required to produce an annual Food Law Service Plan in accordance with the Food Standards Agency' Food Law Code of Practice to meet EU requirements. The overall equalities and social inclusion impacts and risks of the regime were considered at a national and European level at the time of inception of

the policy. The implementation of this year's Food & Feed Law Service Plan aims to continue to ensure that people who live, work or visit the Borough or purchase food produced in the Borough have access to safe unadulterated food, thereby, improving their general lifestyles, health and wellbeing.

It is envisaged that there will be a net positive impact on all sections of the community across all protected characteristics. Children and young people and older people, vulnerable children and adults are amongst the groups that will potentially benefit the most as they are more susceptible to food poisoning.

The plan will also ensure that businesses are compliant with legislation by correctly describing and labelling foods and displaying their food hygiene rating so that consumers can make informed choices. Our interventions ensure that the playing field is level and that a compliant business is not disadvantaged over businesses which may be flouting the law and profiting from it.

Because of the risk to public health, resources are directed towards higher risk premises. Our data shows that the majority of non-compliant businesses are small and medium enterprises and are therefore more likely to be affected by our interventions. There is no reliable data pertaining to the ethnicity of affected businesses. Such information, when available, may help us to address any related issues or patterns, if they exist.

We will continue to direct resources towards high risk premises and look for initiatives to help small and medium enterprise businesses (SMEs) comply and remain compliant.

The Council will ensure that translation and interpreting services are available wherever this is required. The Food Standards Agency also provides some useful leaflets and documents in multiple languages.
