Proposed admission arrangements	The admission arrangements of the school are compliant with the School Admissions Code and are not due to change should the SEND unit be implemented.

These pupils will usually have Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCP), which identify Communication and Interaction Needs as their primary need. The SEND unit will be a self-contained unit which will be sufficiently spacious; to provide for the needs of up to 12 pupils with supported spaces made available for some timetabled activities and any other requirements. The new facilities will allow for 12 additional students who require SEN provision. An additional 5 FTE staff members will be required to support this increase in student numbers and the operation of the new facilities. Mode share analysis, based on the current pupil and staff mode shares, has been carried out to project the likely transport impact that this increase in student and staff numbers will result in. It was determined that the increase in staff numbers will result in three additional car journeys, within the capacity of the staff parking provision. Similarly, the increase in pupil trips will not result in a significant impact to the surrounding road network, with 7 further car trips expected. The school already has in place a STARS School Travel Plan at Bronze accreditation level. Implementation of the soft measures outlined in the transport plan will be the primary method of impact mitigation. The construction of the SEND unit will be undertaken with full accessibility compliance. Funding The local authority has allocated a budget of £1.3 million for this project which will be met within the SEND Capital grant. School premises and playing fields The SEND unit will have access to a safe, sheltered, outdoor space which will adhere to standards for school premises as per the area guidelines for SEND and alternative provision.		All school users will be encouraged to access the schools via sustainable modes of transport.

The establishment of the SEND unit will ensure that school aged children with special educational needs are able to secure a place in a local school and have their needs met in the most inclusive environment possible, whilst being supported in a specialist provision to help them achieve the best possible educational and other outcomes.
