## Part A - Report seeking decision

## DETAIL OF THE DECISION REQUESTED AND RECOMMENDED ACTION

Following a recommendation of the Highways Advisory Committee on 30<sup>th</sup> March 2021 this Executive Decision seeks approval to commence statutory consultation on the alteration of an existing 'pay and display / cashless parking bay' on Heath Drive as follows:

- I. reducing the bay by approximately 11 metres from its northern end and introducing 'at any time' waiting restrictions over the relevant 11 metre length of highway; and
- II. extending the bay by approximately 6 meters from its southern end and removing the existing 'at any time' waiting restrictions from relevant 6 metre length of highway (as shown on the drawing in Appendix A)

If at the close of consultation no objections are received to the proposals above, the scheme should proceed to full implementation. In the case of receipt of objections an objection report, will be submitted seeking an approved way forward.

## STATEMENT OF THE REASONS FOR THE DECISION

In January 2020 our local MP's office wrote to Havering Council advising of concerns raised to them by a resident in regards to sight lines of driver exiting Heath Close on to Heath Drive. The issues with the sight lines are caused by vehicles parking in the pay and display / cashless parking bay' located opposite numbers 5 to 9 Heath Drive.

There is a slight bend in Heath Drive and the location of the existing pay and display/ cashless parking bay, it is apparent that sight lines for vehicles exiting Heath Close on to Heath Drive could be improved.

Officers favour a reduction of the aforementioned 'pay and display / cashless parking bay' at its northern end extending the no waiting at any time restrictions as this reduction to the parking bay will give drivers exiting Heath Close a further 11m of clear sight lines of vehicles travelling northbound on Heath Drive.

This reduction would see the loss of two parking bays therefore to compensate for the loss of the parking provision officers propose to increase to the pay and display / cashless parking bay at its southern end by approximately 6m and remove the existing no waiting at any time restrictions by 6m. This increase to the southern end will reduce the loss of parking provisions whilst still maintaining a safe distance from the junction of Heath Drive and Main Road.

In October 2020 Ward Councillors were sent a copy of the proposed design and all three Ward Councillors were in support.

Approval was received at the Highways Advisory Committee on the 30<sup>th</sup> March 2021 to formally advertise these proposals to improve sight lines and road safety for drivers exiting Heath Close.

## OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED AND REJECTED

No other options were considered.

## PRE-DECISION CONSULTATION

All schemes are presented on Calendar Brief prior to any consultation or design.

Ward Councillors are in support of these proposals.

Approval was received at the Highways Advisory Committee on the 30<sup>th</sup> March 2021 to formally advertise.

## Part B - Assessment of implications and risks

## **LEGAL IMPLICATIONS AND RISKS**

Here Officers seek approval for the amendment of the pay and display/ cashless parking bays and removal/ extension of part of no waiting at any time restrictions in Heath Drive, that pursuant to the Council's Constitution requires an executive decision by the Lead Member for Environment.

The Council's power to make an order regulating or controlling vehicular traffic on roads is set out in Part I of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 ("RTRA 1984") with the power to designate parking places set out under part IV of the RTRA 1984.

Before an Order is made, the Council should ensure that the statutory procedures set out in the Local Authorities Traffic Orders (Procedure)(England & Wales) Regulations 1996 (SI 1996/2489) are complied with. The Traffic Signs Regulations & General Directions 2016 govern road traffic signs and road markings.

Section 122 RTRA 1984 imposes a general duty on local authorities when exercising functions under the RTRA. It provides, insofar as is material, to secure the expeditious, convenient and safe movement of vehicular and other traffic (including pedestrians) and the provision of suitable and adequate parking facilities on and off the highway. This statutory duty must be balanced with any concerns received over the implementation of the proposals.

In considering any responses received during consultation, the Council must ensure that full consideration of all representations is given including those which do not accord with the officer's recommendation. The Council must be satisfied that any objections to the proposals were taken into account.

In considering any consultation responses, the Council must balance the concerns of any objectors with the statutory duty under section 122 RTRA 1984.

## FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS AND RISKS

The estimated costs of £0.001m which include advertising costs and implementing the proposal as described above and shown on the attached plan will be met from the 2022/23 A26910, Schemes budget which at the time of this report has sufficient available budget.

This is a standard project for Schemes and there is no expectation that the works cannot be contained within the cost estimate. In the unlikely event of an overspend, the balance would need to be contained within the overall Public Realm budget.

This reduction would see the loss of two parking bays therefore to compensate for the loss of the parking provision Officers propose a slight increase to the pay and display/cashless parking bay at its southern end by approximately 6m and removal of the existing no waiting at any time restrictions by 6m.. This increase will reduce the loss of parking provisions whilst still maintaining a safe distance from the junction of Heath Drive and Main Road.

## Who will be affected by the activity?

All road users especially residents of Heath Close will have their sight lines improved and safety improved when exiting Heath Close.

Users of the payment parking bays will be disadvantaged as the parking provision would be reduced and they would have to find another provision.

Vehicles will not be able to park on the no waiting at any time restrictions, however they can still load and unload goods and alight passengers.

Blue badge holders can park for up to three hours on the no waiting at any time restrictions and they can park in the payment parking bays free of charge whilst displaying their badge.

There will be some physical and visual impact from the required signing and lining works.
