Part A – Report seeking decision

DETAIL OF THE DECISION REQUESTED AND RECOMMENDED ACTION

This Executive Decision seeks approval to:

- consider and approve the Officers recommendations in relation to the objection received to the statutory consultation as detailed in the Statement of Reasons and
- **II.** agree to implementation of the below measures as detailed in the designs appended to the body of this report:

Upgrade existing "waiting" restrictions to "no waiting at any time"

a) Kings Grove/Kings Road

Upgrade the existing waiting restrictions (single yellow lines) on both arms of the junction of Kings Grove and Kings Road to "No waiting at any time" (double yellow lines).

b) Kings Grove

Extension of the proposed "No waiting at any time" in Kings Grove to a point opposite the existing bays.

Removal of parking bay and installation of "waiting" restriction (single yellow line)

a) Kings Road

Remove parking bay outside of 10 Kings Road and install "waiting" restrictions (Single yellow lines) across the dropped kerb.

Signage review

a) Additional footway parking signage to be added in Kings Road to improve footway parking compliance. This will help highlight the requirement for footway parking to take place within the marked bays.

STATEMENT OF THE REASONS FOR THE DECISION

This proposed minor parking scheme has been designed to improve road safety and traffic flow in Kings Road and Kings Grove, whilst maintaining access for large vehicles including Emergency Service vehicles, refuse and deliveries. The proposals have been reviewed for 'road safety' implications as well as implications for general accessibility and impact on existing parking provision.

On 15th December 2011 planning permission P1875.10 & P1200.12 was granted for four, two bedroom houses in Kings Grove. On 15th December 2011, the applicant entered into a legal agreement with the Council to meet planning obligations pursuant to Section 106 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (Section 106 Agreement). One of the obligations within the Section 106 Agreement required funding to be provided for a parking review to identify any issues as a consequence of the development.

As per the Section 106 Agreement, officers carried out a review, prepared proposals to enhance access and road safety and carried out a formal consultation. The proposals included replacing the single yellow line restriction to 'At Any Time' waiting restrictions (double yellow lines) at the junction and extending down the flank wall to ensure the movement of vehicular traffic along Kings Grove. Additional signage for the existing footway parking bays and extending the existing waiting restriction (8.30am to 6.30pm Monday to Saturday) on Kings Road to prevent obstruction to a vehicle crossing leading to a private parking space. The following provides comments on the details of these elements of the proposals:

Officers considered the existing single yellow lines to be inadequate in dealing with obstructive parking as vehicles could still park during the unrestricted times in Kings Grove and therefore proposed the introduction of double yellow lines to improve road safety and maintain visibility when entering and egressing the junction of Kings Road and Kings Grove. The above proposal would also ensure heavy goods vehicles (HGV's), Emergency Service vehicles and refuse collection services can access the development easily.

As the road is relatively narrow, it is proposed to extend the waiting restrictions on the eastern side to ensure the movement of vehicular traffic.

The proposals also included a review of the current footway parking signage in Kings Road. This review concluded that additional footway parking signage would be beneficial for enforcement of the parking layout and ensure better levels of

compliance. Additional signage will make the footway parking layout clearer to drivers, removing any ambiguity and reducing obstructions within the carriageway.

The resident of number 10 Kings Road has requested a single yellow line to replace the existing parking bays across their dropped crossing due to ongoing obstructive parking from neighbours. The proposals include meeting this request.

The proposals have also been assessed by officers from a road safety perspective and the outcome of the officer assessment was that the proposed scheme would have no adverse impact on road safety. It was felt that a formal Road Safety Audit would not be required. The proposals have been designed to improve road safety, traffic flow, enhance sight lines and maintain accessibility for the emergency services and Council vehicles.

Following the consultation, one objection was received as below;

We don't have any issues with access for emergency services and council vehicles and have never had any problems with traffic flow within our roads yellow lines and resident parking have been in our road for over 30 years without any issues. Havering council is in debt to the tune of 40million so in this exceptional circumstances saving have to be made painting yellow lines on roads that already have yellow line is a total waste of public money when every penny counts. There are many other projects that need your attention and any money you have available

Ward Councillors were made aware of the response to the consultation and were happy to progress as advertised.

Officers Response: Officers have carried out the review of this location as part of the planning agreement and identified some minor improvements to improve road safety and access. The monies provided by the developer via the Section 106 Agreement have been used to carry out the review, design costs and advertising costs. Monies from the Section 106 Agreement can only be spent on this project and have been fully expended in carrying out this review. The proposed changes to the parking layout including additional signage will therefore be funded from the 2022/23 A26910 Schemes budget, which at the time of this report has sufficient available budget.

Highways, Traffic and Parking request approval from the Assistant Director Public Realm to overrule the objection received and proceed with the proposals as advertised

OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED AND REJECTED

The option not to progress this scheme was considered but rejected. Officers consider the need to provide road safety, traffic flow, sight lines and access around Kings Grove and King Road which outweighs the loss of the general parking provision. The Council has obligations under the Road Traffic Regulation Act (1984) to secure the expeditious, convenient and safe movement of vehicular and other traffic

(including cyclists and pedestrians) and to provide suitable and adequate parking facilities on and off the highway.

PRE-DECISION CONSULTATION

The following proposal was publically consulted as per the Council's legal obligations to publicise changes to the traffic orders for a period no less than 21 days commencing 25th November 2022.

Ward Councillors were made aware of the objection and both were fully in support of progressing the scheme.





Part B - Assessment of implications and risks

LEGAL IMPLICATIONS AND RISKS

Officers seek approval for the installation and extension of junction protection markings and the removal of a parking bay which is supported by the Highway Code and pursuant to the Council's Constitution requires an Executive Decision by the Assistant Director Public Realm.

The Council's power to make an order regulating or controlling vehicular traffic on roads is set out in Part I of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 ("RTRA 1984") with the power to designate parking places set out under part IV of the RTRA 1984.

Before an Order is made, the Council should ensure that the statutory procedures set out in the Local Authorities Traffic Orders (Procedure)(England & Wales) Regulations 1996 (SI 1996/2489) are complied with. The Traffic Signs Regulations & General Directions 2016 govern road traffic signs and road markings.

Section 122 RTRA 1984 imposes a general duty on local authorities when exercising functions under the RTRA. It provides, insofar as is material, to secure the expeditious, convenient and safe movement of vehicular and other traffic (including pedestrians) and the provision of suitable and adequate parking facilities on and off the highway. This statutory duty must be balanced with any concerns received over the implementation of the proposals.

In considering any responses received during consultation, the Council must ensure that full consideration of all representations is given including those which do not accord with the officer's recommendation. The Council must be satisfied that any objections to the proposals were taken into account.

In considering any consultation responses, the Council must balance the concerns of any objectors with the statutory duty under section 122 RTRA 1984.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS AND RISKS

The estimated costs of £0.001m which include advertising costs and implementing the signage and lining works as described above and shown on the attached plan will be met from the Highways revenue budget.

This is a standard project for Highways, Traffic and Parking (HTP) and there is no expectation that the works cannot be contained within the cost estimate.

The proposal can be delivered within the standard resourcing within Highways, Traffic and Parking and has no specific impact on staffing/HR issues.

1. The EqHIA – How will the strategy, policy, plan, procedure and/or service impact on people?

Background/context:

The following schemes are designed to improve sight lines, traffic flow, road safety, prevent obstruction and access for the emergency services and Council vehicles in Kings Grove

Who will be affected by the activity?

The installation/ extension of the no waiting at any time restrictions around junctions would improve road safety, traffic flow, sight lines and access for the emergency services which will be of benefit to all residents. This is in line with rule 243 of the Highway Code which states 'you must not park opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, except in an authorised parking space'

These restrictions will impact on the parking capacity for residents and their visitors but blue badge holders can park on the no waiting at any time restrictions for up to three hours.

The installation of no waiting at any time restrictions will aid larger vehicles (emergency services and Council vehicles) and have street cleaning benefits.

Vehicles will not be able to park on the no waiting at any time restrictions, however they can still load and unload goods and alight passengers.

The implementation of a single yellow line will remove parking for two vehicles but will assist the resident at number 10 Kings Road with their access issues due to obstructive parking
