#### DETAIL OF THE DECISION REQUESTED AND RECOMMENDED ACTION

For the reasons set out in the report, the Director of Planning and Public Protection is recommended to approve the award of contract to the selected supplier, Box Up, following the outcome of the Council's tendering process to provide a sports-based youth diversion initiative in Harold Hill.

## STATEMENT OF THE REASONS FOR THE DECISION

The Council invited three suppliers to bid for the opportunity to deliver this programme using MOPAC funding of £25,000 per year over 3 years. All three bidders submitted bids.

The tendering process has been completed, and Box Up has been identified as the most suitable supplier. This decision formalizes the award of the contract to Box Up to deliver the specified services outlined in the tender documents.

To determine the successful bidder for the youth diversionary project in Harold Hill, a structured scoring matrix was employed. Each proposal was evaluated against six weighted criteria: Project Approach (25%), Experience and Credentials (20%), Outcome Measurement (15%), Staffing (15%), Value for Money (15%), and Local Relevance (10%). Responses were scored on a 0–5 scale, ranging from "Unacceptable" to "Excellent," with detailed explanations guiding assessors on how to interpret each score.

## **Rank Proposal Total Score**

1 Box Up- 98.89

2 Bid A- 94

3 Bid C- 85.17

Box Up's proposal was distinguished by its comprehensive evidence of local engagement in Harold Hill, detailed staffing qualifications including female facilitators, and robust outcome measurement strategies.

This scoring process ensured transparency, consistency, and alignment with strategic priorities, ultimately selecting Box Up as the preferred bidder based on its superior alignment with the project's objectives and community needs.

#### OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED AND REJECTED

No other options were considered viable as Box Up was selected through a competitive tendering process.

## Part B - Assessment of implications and risks

#### **LEGAL IMPLICATIONS AND RISKS**

Section 1 of the Localism Act 2011 gives the Council a general power of competence to do anything an individual can do. The recommendation in this report is in keeping with this power and the Council has the power to award the grant funding to an appropriate service delivery provider.

The proposed contract value is estimated to be £75,000 and is below the applicable procurement threshold for service contracts and accordingly the procurement process does not fall within the rigours of the Procurement Act 2023. In accordance with CPR 9.8 the Council's officers were required to obtain at least 3 comparable written quotations using the e-tendering suite Request for Quotation procedure and completed this.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS AND RISKS

This report seeks approval to award a delivery partner (Box Up) for youth diversionary activities in Harold Hill, funded by a £75,000 grant from MOPAC VRU over three financial years (£25,000 annually from 2025/26 to 2027/28). The funding will fully cover delivery costs, with no additional financial contribution required from the Council.

The grant will be disbursed in equal annual instalments and is ring-fenced to cover staffing and venue hire for weekly sessions. All funds must be spent by 31 March 2028 and cannot be carried forward. The service will need to monitor the contractual performance against the terms and conditions of the MOPAC VRU grant.
